Psychology Mission Statement:

The Bachelor of Arts in Psychology provides a foundation for traditional and non-traditional students who wish to become psychologists. It also prepares students to become self-aware, lifelong learners by delivering analytical, quantitative, and problem-solving skills that lead to employment in a variety of work settings.

Conceptual relationship among university, program, and course learning goals and objectives:

The goals of the program are consistent with the University-wide learning goals and, in some cases, directly support attainment of one or more such goals. While we recognize that learning occurs in a broader context than the classroom, this program attains its learning goals primarily through the courses it requires of students (see curriculum matrix).

The learning objectives of individual courses always support the goals of the program but this does not prevent them from supporting other goals. Learning objectives in an individual course are assessable. Therefore, the assessment of related learning objectives across several courses within our program enables us to ascertain how well the program goals are being met. It follows that the attainment of University-wide learning goals can be evaluated by looking across the curriculum within this program at all the assessments that are related to these goals.

Process for setting learning goals and objectives:

The program faculty has focused on programmatic goals and course learning objectives as a part of two program reviews conducted in the past eight years involving external reviewers. Faculty members have discussed both formally and informally what they hope to accomplish through the program and what they expect students to learn while in the program. Guidance also comes from APA guidelines for undergraduate psychology programs. These program goals and their operational definitions within various courses will be agreed to by faculty members teaching in the program after the initial assessment plan has been accepted by the department. The goals and objectives are not cast in stone and will undergo ongoing review as part of the university assessment cycle.

Program Goals

The psychology major is built around four components: Foundation, Diversity, Breadth (exposure to a cross section of the discipline) and advanced research. Psychology electives also supplement each of these areas. The departmental goals are therefore divided up to correspond to the appropriate area of the major requirements as follows.

Foundation

- 1. To foster in our students the ability to think scientifically about human behavior and psychological processes, to evaluate research methods and designs, to distinguish observations from conclusions, and to appreciate the differences between conclusions based on evidence and those based on speculation.
- 2. To provide students with some breadth of understanding of psychology, and with a basic knowledge of statistics, research design and analysis.
- 3. To provide students with the opportunities to learn different approaches to the study of psychology, such as biological, interpersonal, and sociological approaches.
- 4. To help our students learn to speak and write intelligently and effectively both in the language of the discipline and generally, and to conduct library research in support of such efforts.

Diversity

1. To foster respect and appreciation for diversity for others, and for the contribution of that diversity to psychology both as a science and as a profession.

Breadth

- 1. To allow students opportunities to be both active and collaborative learners through course work, research, fieldwork, and community service as fits their individual interests and curricular needs.
- 2. To introduce students to the ethical practice of scientific inquiry, and to provide opportunities for them to consider ethical issues and values both within and beyond the discipline.

Advanced Research

- 1. To better prepare students for graduate work in the field of psychology and related fields.
- 2. To further critical thinking skills.

General

- 1. To impart the skills and enthusiasm that will allow graduates to make useful contributions to society through their employment and/or community participation.
- 2. To assist our students' personal academic and professional growth through activities such as advising, collaborating on research projects, bringing students to professional meetings, writing letters of recommendation, and participating in Psi Chi activities.

• Goal 1. To foster in our students the ability to think scientifically about human behavior and psychological processes, to evaluate research methods and designs, to distinguish observations from conclusions, and to appreciate the differences between conclusions based on evidence and those based on speculation.

Summary and next steps

This is a draft of an assessment plan. The procedure required by the Dean's office is to next discus this within the department at the beginning of the fall semester. It should be approved (modified as needed etc.) by the end of September. Then the plan is to complete a full assessment over the next three years completing approximately one third of the assessment each year. Once I present this document to the department, the department chair is required to take over and complete the process. I am recommending the following strategy.

Goals 1-4 (Foundation) to be assessed during the 2008-9 academic year.

Goals 5-8 (Departmental academic requirements) to be assessed during the 2009-10 academic year.

Goals 9-11 Broad based goals) to be assessed during the 2010-11 academic year.

I would suggest however that assessing the goals for subsequent years be begun in the 2008-9 year because the data is based on longer term experiences and will have to be set in place before any assessment begins.

Some general observations.

I think that based on the curriculum map the department has a face valid case that the academic related goals are being met. I am proposing three new assessment elements to facilitate going beyond face validity. The first is to use embedded questions in various courses. These questions can be decided by the department and added to any test(s) offered during the semester. If they are goal-based questions then they should be appropriate for every section of the same course. A faculty member could opt out of using the answers as part of a test score but would be required to ask and provide scores on these questions back to the department. Second I am proposing that we develop a small portfolio process to be evaluated by a group of faculty. It would include a reflective paper, an academic paper, a reaction paper and a research paper (from ARM). By integrating this into the curriculum it should not be an onerous burden on either the student or the faculty. Third we might consider developing an evaluation instrument based on how the department is perceived by the students as having met our goals. It should be clear from the materials I have put together than in terms of assessment it is goals 9-11 that need the most attention.

I am also suggesting that the University powers that be ensure that alumni surveys are initiated by the appropriate university office. We should also as individual faculty members keep better records of where are advisees go after graduation if we know. For example, how many letters of recommendation did we write, what type of programs, how many students got admitted etc.). These statistics would help our assessment of goals 10 and 11 and go beyond anecdotal reports. I would also note that several departmental faculty members have provided feedback as I have sent out pieces of this document. It was noted that "when I teach this course" the curriculum map should include additional points. The curriculum map was my best effort to take the learning goals from the past two years supply of course syllabi and parse them down to fit the departmental goals. If something does not match what you teach this could be my mistake, it could be that your syllabus does not highlight this element or most likely that during the past two years the course has been taught by an adjunct professor. Any gap between what would normally be taught and what the adjunct teaches can be used as a discussion point when reviewing course expectations with new hires.
