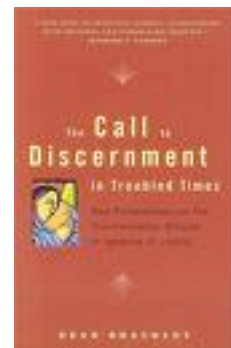

Dean Brackley, SJ is a worldwide thought leader in Jesuit social justice ministry and education. He has taught theology and ethics at the Universidad Centroamericana (UCA) in San Salvador, El Salvador since 1990, where he volunteered to go immediately following the murder of his six brother Jesuits and their two coworkers there in 1989. Fr. Brackley is originally from upstate New York. He was ordained a priest in 1976 and received his doctorate in theological ethics at the University of Chicago in 1980. He has taught at Fordham University and worked in social ministry on Manhattan's Lower East Side and the South Bronx.

Fr. Brackley's published works include *Divine Revolution: Salvation and Liberation in Catholic Thought* (Orbis Books, 1996) and *The Call to Discernment in Troubled Times: New Perspectives on the Transformative Wisdom of Ignatius Loyola* (Crossroad, 2004) which received an award from the Catholic Press Association in 2005.
