

Finding E-books

What is an E-book?

An e-book, sometimes called an electronic book, is an electronic (or digital) equivalent of a conventional printed book. Books that are available electronically may also be available as a printed book or they may only be published in an electronic format.

How can I access E-books?

E-books are available through several USF library databases, as well as through links in [Ignacio](#), the USF libraries online catalog, to individual e-books. There are also free and commercial sources of e-books available on the World Wide Web.

E-books through the Library

Current E-books

General/Multi-Discipline

NetLibrary: Provides access in electronic format to the full-text of more than 3,500 traditionally published books. These books allow access for one user per book at a time. If the title is currently available, the link will read, “View this eBook”.

ebrary: Online access to the full text of nearly 25,000 book titles in key subject areas such as Business & Economics, Computers & Technology, Language & Literature, Medicine, History & Philosophy.

Searching for E-books in Ignacio: The e-books in these two databases can be searched and viewed directly through NetLibrary and ebrary, or they can be searched in Ignacio, the USF libraries’ online catalog.

- Begin with an author search in Ignacio, entering either “netlibrary” or “ebrary” in the search box.
- This will retrieve all but the very most recent additions to the NetLibrary or ebrary databases.
- You can now search from among this list of e-books for specific subjects, authors, titles, publishers, language, etc., by clicking on the “Limit this Search” box at the top of the page and entering your search parameters in this page.

Gale Virtual Reference Library: This database includes online access to more than 80 encyclopedias, almanacs and specialized references sources for multidisciplinary research. See the [complete list of sources](#) for specific titles that are included.

Computers and Technology

Safari Books Online: Online, full-text access to more than 1,200 computer and technology books published in the last two years from publishers such as O'Reilly, Addison Wesley, Sams, Prentice Hall, Que, Cisco Press, Peachpit Press, New Riders Publishing, Course Technology, IBM Press, Macromedia, Adobe Press, Syngress, etc. These titles are also cataloged in [Ignacio](#), USF libraries' online catalog.

Psychology

PsycBooks: More than 13,000 chapters in PDF from over 700 books published by the American Psychological Association (APA) and other distinguished publishers. The database includes most scholarly titles published by APA from copyright years 1953 – 2004. It also includes 100 out-of-print books and an additional 70+ classic books of landmark historical impact in psychology.

Historical Collections of E-books

Eighteenth Century Collections Online: Digital images of every page of 150,000 books published in the U.K. in the eighteenth century (1701-1800). This database makes available online hard-to-find material in every academic discipline including: History & Geography; Social Science; Fine Arts, Music & Architecture; Medicine, Science & Technology; Literature & Language; Religion & Philosophy; Law; and Reference.

Free E-books on the Web

There are many Web sites that either provide access directly to e-books or function as directories or guides to e-books on the Web. There are e-books available to purchase on the Web, however the resources listed below will lead you to free e-books on the Web.

Project Gutenberg: Collection of e-books begun in 1971 and is produced largely by volunteers. There are currently 20,000 free books that are available in their [Online Book Catalog](#). The three portions of the Project Gutenberg Library are Light Literature, Heavy Literature and References.

The Internet Public Library (IPL) Online Texts Collection: The IPL has compiled links to many free online texts. A few examples of resources available at this site include, *The Aeneid of Vergil*, Bibliomania, Christian Classics Ethereal Library, *Treasure Island* and the Victorian Women Writers Project.

Google Book Search: A tool from Google that searches the full text of books obtained from publishers and libraries that Google scans and stores in its digital database. You can view bibliographic data and either the full text (if it is in the public domain), a limited preview, a snippet view or no preview. Each item includes links to either purchase the book or find the book at a library.
