SUMMARY

Kelly L'Engle, PhD, MPH, is a Health Behavior and Communication Scientist with 25 years experience in research and program development in the health sector. Dr. L'Engle joined the faculty of the University of San Francisco, School of Nursing and Health Professions in August 2015. She currently serves as Director of the Master in Public Health-Behavioral Health concentration, and previously served as Department Chair and MPH Program Director. Dr. L'Engle teaches classes in research methods, program planning and evaluation, health and risk communication, professionalism in health education and health promotion, adolescent health, applied practice experience, and integrated learning experience. From 2007-2015, she served FHI 360 as a Senior Scientist where she led and partnered on front-line population health research and program development in cross-cultural and global settings. Dr. L'Engle is expert in developing, testing, and evaluating health interventions globally, and she is a leading expert on mobile health technologies and mixed-methods research. Previously, Dr. L'Engle was Project Director on a National Institutes of Health longitudinal study of adolescent health and media, served as a Research Analyst for health behavior change communication campaigns, and provided education and counseling services in a variety of public and behavioral health settings. Dr. L'Engle has built a strong track record in innovative health research and programming, especially in digital health, and particularly among young people, at-risk populations, and diverse communities. She earned her Ph.D. and M.P.H. in health behavior sciences and has a A.B. in development studies.
